2012 *The Emblematics of the Self: Ekphrasis and Identity in Renaissance Imitations of Greek Romance*. Toronto: U of Toronto P. (E-book version, 2013).

This book examines how ekphrasis, the verbal representation of visual representation, illuminates gender, ethnic, and religious identity in Renaissance imitations of ancient Greek romances by Achilles Tatius and Heliodorus. Rather than presuming individual agency in romance characterization, I propose that romance identity is passible (susceptible or impressionable) and that ekphrastic characterization—what I call the emblematics of the self—discloses adaptations in cultural identity. Renaissance romancers craft verbal images to function as graphic puzzles, and romance characters such as cross-dressed Amazons and white Mauritians reveal their ethos in the act of interpretation. Alonso Núñez de Reinoso, Philip Sidney, Miguel de Cervantes, Mary Wroth, and John Barclay craft romances that undo criteria for cultural otherness in their manipulations of multivalent verbal pictures and reflect European

cultural anxieties; yet these works also promise the possibility of cultural assimilation through the romance genre's forte, love and marriage.

This project examines disability in the Renaissance in conduct books and treatises, travel writing, and wonder books. The cross-section of texts is comparative, putting canonical European authors such as Castiglione into dialogue with transatlantic and Anglo-Ottoman literary exchange. Its methodology takes a formal and philosophical approach to pre-modern formulations of monstrous bodies, spaces, and narratives, which continue to shape our understandings of disability today. My work discerns the norming of early modern bodies in the discourse of the ideal and the natural, and it discovers alternative representations of embodiment that allow for variation and vulnerability. It overturns the assumption that "monstrosity" was relegated to the margins of the world from antiquity to the Renaissance, and it questions grand narratives propounding a progression of disability from supernatural marvel to medical specimen. I contend that these categories coexist and intersect, and that we can better understand early modern productions of disability by attending to the rich variety of monstrous bodies, spaces, and narratives that populate Renaissance texts.

In progress "Crip Authority: Disability and the Art of Consolation in Literature of the Global Renaissance."

This book considers how early modern writers with disabilities from a variety of cultural and geographic backgrounds embrace their status as "cripples" to enhance their authority, be it literary, military, political, or religious authority. The project draws on the critical traditions of disability studies, life writing, and prison writing, as well as the long literary tradition of consolation texts, to explore a cross-section of early modern authors, including Petrarch, Teresa de Cartagena, Sor Juana Inez de la Cruz, Michel de Montaigne, Cervantes, John Milton, Hester Pulter, Anne Bradstreet, and William Hay.
